BRAZIL'S BOLSONARO JOINS PL AND SEALS LINK WITH CENTRÃO VOTING BLOC

After two years with no party and months of negotiations, President Jair Bolsonaro on Tuesday, November 30, signed his affiliation to the PL (Liberal Party) to run for reelection in 2022. The affiliation ceremony took place on Evangelical Day, at the Brasil 21 Complex, in Brasília, and was attended by legislators and ministry officials. SENATE APPROVES IN TWO ROUNDS PEC OF PRECATÓRIO

With a loose vote, the Senate approved, in the early afternoon of this Thursday (2), in two rounds, the so-called PEC dos Precatório. In the first round, the score was 64 in favor and 13 against, while in the second round there were 61 votes in favor and 10 against. To enable voting on the text and guarantee the minimum 49 votes needed in each turn in the Senate plenary, the government leader in the House and rapporteur of the proposal, Fernando Bezerra Coelho (MDB-PE), made significant last-minute changes in the last version of the text that had been approved last Tuesday (30) by the Committee on Constitution and Justice (CCJ). BRAZIL GDP DROPS IN 3RD QUARTER BY 0.1%, REFLECTING STABILITY, SAYS IBGE

The Brazilian Gross Domestic Product (GDP) decreased 0.1% in the third quarter of 2021, compared to the previous three months, in the seasonally adjusted series, reported the Brazilian Institute of Geography and Statistics (IBGE) on Thursday. Agriculture and Livestock fell 8%, Industry was stable, and Services increased 1.1%. Read more.

INDUSTRIAL SALES IN BRAZIL DROP FOR THIRD CONSECUTIVE MONTH - CNI

The real turnover of the manufacturing industry fell 2% in October, compared to September, according to the Industrial Indicators, from the National Confederation of Industry (CNI), released today (1). This is the third consecutive monthly drop in sales, which has accumulated a retraction of 8% in this period. With this, the industry's total sales retreated to the lowest amount since June 2020, when the economy and the productive sector were still recovering from the closure of activities in the first wave of Covid-19. In the comparison with October 2020, the turnover has registered a drop of 12.8%. Read more.

The OECD projects for Brazil a growth of 5% in its economic activity this year and 1.4% in 2022 but recommends its authorities to undertake fiscal reforms to address the "significant increase" in inflation in recent months. This is stated in the section dedicated to Brazil by the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) in its economic outlook report released on Wednesday, which estimates that there will be a global growth of 5.6% this year. S&P CONFIRMS BB - RATING FOR BRAZIL; STABLE OUTLOOK

Rating agency S&P Global has affirmed Brazil's foreign currency rating at BB-. The announcement was made on Tuesday, November 30. The outlook for the country's rating is stable. "Spending pressures and the high-interest burden are likely to lead to slow fiscal consolidation, with general government net debt trending toward 75% of GDP by 2024," said S&P, which believes that the stable outlook for the grade assumes that the government will gradually stabilize its recent growth in public debt. UNEMPLOYMENT DROPS IN 20 OF BRAZIL'S 27 STATES BETWEEN SECOND AND THIRD OUARTERS

The unemployment rate posted a statistically significant drop in 20 of the 27 Brazilian states between the second and third quarters, according to data from the Continuous National Household Sample Survey (PNAD Continuous), released by the Brazilian Institute of Geography and Statistics (IBGE). The highest unemployment rates were found in Pernambuco (19.3%), Bahia (18.7%), Amapá (17.5%), Alagoas (17.1%) and Sergipe (17.0%). The lowest results were seen in Santa Catarina (5.3%), Mato Grosso (6.6%), Mato Grosso do Sul (7.6%), Rondônia (7.8%) and Paraná (8.0%). Read more.

SENTENCES ABOUT THE VETO OVER THE LICENCING COMPULSORY BILL ARE PROJECTED IN THE FEDERAL SENATE

The Federal Senate building received the phrases 'A Vida Asks Permit' and 'Law 14,200 Saves Lives' this Thursday night (2). The projections were requested by senator Paulo Paim (PT-RS) with the aim of improving the government's capacity to face the covid-19 pandemic, as well as other health emergencies that may arise. The Law 14.200, 2021, was sanctioned with five vetoes by President Jair Bolsonaro, on 2 September. If the vetoed devices were already in effect, it would be possible to determine the temporary breaking of patents on vaccines and supplies in periods of emergency or state of public calamity. CHAMBER APPROVES REVOCATION OF SUBSIDIES ON MEDICINES AND HEALTH PRODUCTS

The Chamber of Deputies approved this Wednesday (1/12), symbolically, the PL 5149/2020 intended to extend the exemption from the Tax on Industrialized Products (IPI) on the acquisition of passenger cars, acquisition of cars for use in autonomous transport passengers or by people with disabilities and to extend the benefit to people with hearing impairments. To offset the tax exemption, the approved text revokes tax subsidies (exemption from PIS/COFINS) for medicines and other health products established in laws 10.637/2002; 10833/2003; and 10865/2004. COMMITTEE PASSES THE FIRST PART OF THE TEXT TO AUTHORIZE PRIVATE COMPANIES TO PRODUCE RADIOPHARMACEUTICALS

The special committee of the Chamber of Deputies destined to analyze the PEC 517/2010, which allows the production of radioisotopes for medical use by the private sector, approved on Wednesday (1) the basic text of the rapporteur, Deputy General Peternelli (PSL-SP). Read more.

ASSOCIATIONS LAUNCH MANIFESTO AGAINST CHANGES IN HEALTH PLAN LAW

Idec and other association have sent a manifesto to congressmen discussing changes in legislation on complementary health in Congress. According to Veja, the document, addressed to the Special Committee on Health Plans, of the Chamber, criticizes the actions of operators who are trying to "force changes" which, as a result, say the signatories, will reduce coverage and worsen the quality of services provided. The letter was also signed by the Brazilian

Association of Health Economics, the Association of Servers and Other Workers of the National Supplementary Health Agency, the Brazilian Center for Health Studies, and the Brazilian Association of Collective Health. The so-called "affordable plans" are the main target of criticism from the entities, which point out that this type of agreement is often cheaper, but with limited coverage. Read more.

DECISION ABOUT THE LIST OF HEALTH INSURANCE PLANS WILL REMAIN FOR 2022

The continuation of the judgment that will decide whether the list of procedures and events of the National Agency for Supplementary Health (ANS) is exemplary or exhaustive, will remain for 2022. The information was confirmed by the minister of the Superior Court of Justice (STJ) Nancy Andrighi, who is requesting a review of the case. The case is judged in the 2nd Section of the STJ, through the EREsp 1886929/SP and the EREsp 1889704/SP, both reporting by the minister Luis Felipe Salomão. The trial began on September 16, with the rapporteur's vote in defense of the exhaustive list, but with exceptions. Right after Salomão's vote, minister Nancy Andrighi asked to be seen and so far, has not returned the process to the agenda. When voting, Salomão spoke about the security of legal relations and affirmed that the Judiciary has a fundamental role in promoting a fair and balanced interpretation of legislation, "without sentimentality and preconceived ideas". His arguments were fundamentally based on the defense of the legislation that governs the supplementary sector, on the legitimacy of the ANS as a regulator, on the contractual economic balance, and on the scientific proof of mandatory coverage treatments. For Minister Salomão, administrative or judicial decisions outside the law can aggravate the financial situation of health plan operators and, ultimately, affect the confidence and expectations of consumers, making the problem no longer just that of the operator, and start to reach the whole society, so that the problem is no longer just the operator's problem and starts to affect society as a whole.so that the problem is no longer just the operator's problem and starts to affect society. BRAZIL SUPPORTS NEGOTIATION OF GLOBAL PACT TO PREVENT NEW PANDEMICS

Brazil is co-sponsor with 100 other countries of a decision closed on Monday (29) to negotiate an international mechanism to prevent future outbreaks from becoming pandemics again such as the Covid-19. The World Health Organization (W.H.O.) special assembly is expected to approve by Wednesday (1) that negotiations begin next year. From there, disagreements are likely to grow over format, devices, rights, and obligations during an outbreak. Read more.

BRAZIL'S HEALTH REGULATOR APPROVES FIRST ONE-PILL HIV TREATMENT

The Brazilian Health Regulatory Agency (ANVISA) has approved the first HIV treatment combining two different substances in a single pill. The new drug is a combination of lamivudine and sodium dolutegravir. Previously, patients were required to take two pills or more, depending on the type of treatment. Read more.
