BRAZIL'S BOLSONARO NAMES NEW CITIZENSHIP MINISTER IN CABINET RESHUFFLE

Brazil's President Jair Bolsonaro on Friday named Congressman João Roma as citizenship minister, replacing Onyx Lorenzoni who will become the presidential secretary general, according to a notice in the official government gazette. The reshuffle had been expected as part of Bolsonaro's political horse trading to shore up support in Congress around the election this month of new leadership in both houses of the federal legislature. FEDERAL GOVERNMENT TO FOCUS DEFORESTATION EFFORTS ON 11 CRITICAL MUNICIPALITIES – BRAZIL'S VP MOURÃO

Vice-President Hamilton Mourão said on Wednesday, February 10th, that 70% of environmental crimes in the Amazon region occur in 11 municipalities, located in four states, and that these will be the government's priority areas for inspection in the region after the Armed Forces' military operations are completed on April 30th. GOVERNMENT DECIDES TO WITHDRAW MILITARY PERSONNEL FROM THE AMAZON AND LIMIT ENFORCEMENT TO 11 CITIES IN 4 STATES

After a year of deploying the Armed Forces to fight against deforestation in the Amazon, the federal government decided to withdraw the military from the region as of May 1 and limit enforcement to 11 cities in four states. Data shows that deforestation increased in the Amazon forest. Vice President Hamilton Mourão made the announcement on Wednesday (10). Mourão chairs the Amazon Council, responsible for coordinating ministries' activities in the environmental area in nine states. According to the vice president, after a transition period between April 15 and 30, the inspection will be carried out with Ibama, ICMBio, Funai, Incra's own staff, in addition to the Federal Police and the Federal Highway. GOVERNMENT EXPECTS US\$ 590 MILLION A YEAR FROM PRIVATE INITIATIVE TO ADOPT PARKS IN THE AMAZON FOREST

The federal government signed on Tuesday (9) a program for which it hopes to raise R\$3.2 billion (US\$ 590 million) per year from the national private initiative for the preservation of parks in environmental reserves in the Amazon. BRAZIL REPORTS 51,546 NEW CORONAVIRUS CASES, 1,288 DEATHS

Brazil recorded 51,546 additional confirmed cases of the novel coronavirus in the past 24 hours, along with 1,288 more deaths from COVID-19, the Health Ministry said on Friday. Brazil has registered more than 9.7 million cases of the virus since the pandemic began, while the official death toll has risen to 237,489, according to ministry data. Read more.

BRAZIL CHAMBER OF DEPUTIES PASSES BILL CRIMINALIZING CUTTING IN LINE FOR VACCINATION

The Chamber of Deputies on Thursday, February 11th, passed a bill that criminalizes jumping the queue for vaccination. The text will now be examined by the Senate. The State of Amazonas could spread the health crisis across the whole national territory. The same team of scientists that last August predicted the second collapse in Manaus' healthcare system because of Covid-19 in an article published in Nature magazine, now points to a third wave of the disease in the region. According to the researchers, the State of Amazonas could spread the health crisis to the whole of Brazil unless authorities impose a lockdown with at least 90% of the population isolated and a faster mass vaccination than in the rest of the country. BRAZIL TO HAVE AT LEAST 90 MILLION VACCINE DOSES BY APRIL

According to the main vaccine developing laboratories in Brazil, the country will have at least 90 million doses of Covid-19 vaccines available by April. According to the count, 46 million doses of the CoronaVac – developed by Sinovac Life Science in partnership with the Butantan Institute – should be delivered to the Ministry of Health over these first four months of the year. Starting in March, the Oswaldo Cruz Foundation (Fiocruz) will also be actively involved in

the National Immunization Program. The first delivery is expected to take place in March, with 15 million doses. Another 27 million should be supplied the following month. Read more.

CONGRESS'S POSITION ON 5-DAY VACCINCE APPROVAL IS "CRIMINAL" – FORMER ANVISA PRESIDENT
