GENERIC MEDICINE MARKET LAUNCHES DRUGS AFTER STF DECISION ON PATENTS

The pharmaceutical market is beginning to feel the effects of the STF decision that annulled the section of the Industrial Property Law that gave rise to patents with an indefinite term, highlighted the column S.A. in Folha de S.Paulo. A few days after the authorization for the breaking of more than 3,400 patents in the health area, last week, the Brazilian EMS took to pharmacies its version of generic drug of the molecule rivaroxaban, used in the treatment of stroke, thrombosis, and embolism. With the launch, EMS will compete in the market with Bayer, owner of the reference drug Xarelto, one of the highlights among anticoagulants. The Brazilian manufacturer had five launches of generics in this year's portfolio, such as products for chronic pain and osteoporosis. The Supreme Court's decision raises the plan to seven. The reaction of EMS was seen in the sector as agile and possible because the company bet on the positive scenario and anticipated with the bureaucratic process. "Everyone is looking at the list of molecules that had their deadline extension suspended and can now have their generics produced," says Reginaldo Arcuri, president of FarmaBrasil, an industry association. The list of patents that will be corrected on the effective date or will be overturned was released by Inpi on Tuesday (18). Patents that have already been granted extension will be extinguished. FOR THE FIRST TIME, AGENCY OF THE MINISTRY OF HEALTH STANDS AGAINST THE USE OF CHLOROQUINE, IVERMECTIN AND AZITHROMYCIN IN HOSPITALS

Technical group linked to the Ministry of Health disapproves, in a new opinion, the use of drugs with proven ineffectiveness against Covid-19, such as chloroquine, hydroxychloroquine, ivermectin and azithromycin, in hospital settings. It is the first time in 14 months of a pandemic that there is a contrary positioning of an organ linked to the paste in relation to the use of these drugs. The text has already received a favorable opinion from the National Commission for the Incorporation of Technologies in the SUS (Conitec), which opened a public consultation on Monday. <u>Read more</u>.

FIOCRUZ HALTS COVID VACCINE PRODUCTION IN BRAZIL FOR SHORTAGE OF RAW MATERIAL

The Oswaldo Cruz Foundation (Fiocruz) on Thursday, May 20, suspended production of the Oxford/AstraZeneca vaccine due to a raw material shortage. Fiocruz is expecting the arrival from China of a shipment of the active pharmaceutical ingredient (API) on Saturday, May 22, to restart production. On Friday, May 14, the Butantan Institute in São Paulo had also completely suspended the production of the CoronaVac vaccine due to a raw material shortage. Read more.

ONE IN FOUR USED MEDICINE TO TREAT EARLY OR PREVENT COVID-19, SHOWS DATAFOLHA

About a quarter of the Brazilian population used some medication to treat Covid-19 early or to prevent it, according to a Datafolha survey that sought to identify people's behavior during the Sars-CoV-2 coronavirus pandemic. A share of 23% of all respondents said they had used an early or preventive drug to deal with the disease. Interviews were carried out face-to-face with 2,071 participants by Datafolha in 146 municipalities between May 11 and 12, 2021. The margin of error is 2 percentage points more or less. Of the survey participants, 12% said they had taken some medication on their own, and another 11% said they had purchased the medicine with a prescription. <u>Read more.</u>
