COVID CPI: HEALTH SECRETARY CONTRADICTS PAZUELLO, CONFIRMS EARLY TREATMENT WITH CHLOROQUINE

The Parliamentary Investigative Committee known as "Covid CPI" on Tuesday, May 25, heard the Ministry of Health's Secretary of Work and Health Education Management Mayra Pinheiro. In almost 7 hours of testimony, the official, known as "Captain Chloroquine," denied having been ordered to prescribe the use of drugs with no proven efficacy for Covid-19, and once again advocated "early treatment." 71% OF BRAZILIANS DO NOT BELIEVE IN ECONOMIC RECOVERY IN 2021

Approximately 7 out of 10 Brazilians believe that the economic recovery will not occur in 2021, reveals a survey released by Boa Vista (BOAS3) on Friday, May 28. In the overall picture, 29% totally or partially believe that recovery will occur this year. On the other hand, 71% of respondents disagree or are partially against the argument that the recovery will occur in 2021. However, a good part of Brazilians agree that vaccination is a crucial factor for the country to get back on track. Read more.

ECONOMY MINISTER DENIES LEAVING MERCOSUR, BUT SAYS BRAZIL INTENDS TO MODERNIZE IT

Economy Minister Paulo Guedes on Thursday reiterated that the Brazilian government does not want to leave MERCOSUR, but rather modernize the bloc. "We are not leaving MERCOSUR. We want to pursue integration, but it is not working as it should. We want to modernize MERCOSUR," he said, speaking at an event held by the Industry Coalition. Read more.

Brazil's Economy Minister Paulo Guedes argued that Brazil is cheap for foreign investors and said that "gringos" entering Brazil at the moment, with the dollar quoted near R\$5.50, will be able to leave with the currency at R\$3 in "two or three years". Read more.

UNDER BOLSONARO, UNDEREMPLOYMENT, LOW PRODUCTIVITY AND LEAKS HAMPER BRAZIL'S GROWTH

Brazil's low-income job market is expected to maintain the trend of increasing informality over the past decade. According to experts, this will be one of the main obstacles to the acceleration of growth and to the rescue of millions of Brazilians who have fallen into abject poverty during the pandemic. In the past decade, Brazil had the worst performance in the last 120 years, pushing the last generation into informality - an area of the economy that pays, produces, and grows less, jeopardizing its average evolution. In the pandemic, even informal work was decimated by the paralysis of the service sector, responsible for 70% of the GDP (Gross Domestic Product) and jobs, half of them out of formality. Read more.

BOLSONARO ENACTS BRAZIL-U.A.E. AGREEMENT ENDING DOUBLE TAXATION

President Jair Bolsonaro on Wednesday, May 26, enacted the agreement signed between Brazil and the United Arab Emirates to end double taxation on income taxes and prevent tax evasion and tax avoidance. The protocol between the two countries was signed in November 2018 and was then passed by the National Congress. The president's enactment gives efficacy to the agreement, which is now officially in force. Read more.

After a motorcycle caravan that gathered thousands of people, Bolsonaro climbed on a sound car and delivered a speech in which he once again criticized governors and mayors who decreed lockdowns and said that the Brazilian Army - or "my Army," as he likes to call it - would never take to the streets to force people to stay home. Disapproval of President Jair Bolsonaro's government is at the worst point since he took office in January 2019. Brazilians who rate the administration as bad or terrible account for 50%. Despite the health, political and economic crises, most Brazilians say they are proud of the country and hopeful about the future, according to Datafolha. According to the institute, 70% of respondents say they are more proud than ashamed of Brazil, compared to 26% who said the opposite. UNEMPLOYMENT RATE IN BRAZIL REACHES 14.7%, THE HIGHEST LEVEL SINCE 2012

Unemployment in Brazil reached 14.7% between January and March this year, equivalent to 14.8 million people looking for work, the highest level recorded in the country since 2012, the government reported Thursday, May 27. The unemployment rate in the first quarter of the year increased 0.8 percentage points compared to the last three months of 2020, when it stood at 13.9%, according to data released by the state-run Brazilian Institute of Geography and Statistics (IBGE). 'WE ARE LIBERALS, BUT WE ARE NOT FOOLS,' SAYS BRAZIL'S MINISTER GUEDES ON ECONOMIC OPENNESS

Once again, the Minister listed the measures taken by the government during the Covid-19 pandemic and advocated mass vaccination of the population for a safe return to work. "Brazil is at war with the virus, we can't fool ourselves about that," he reiterated. Read more.

CORONAVIRUS: THIRD WAVE IN BRAZIL WILL HAVE GREATER POLITICAL IMPACT – CREDIT SUISSE

The third wave of the coronavirus, which is beginning to show its signs in Brazil, will have a greater impact on politics than on the economy, affirms Credit Suisse in a report to clients on Wednesday, May 26. Over the past two weeks, the number of cases has increased in regions such as the South and Midwest, the bank points out. While the rolling average of deaths remained steady at around 2,000 per day last month, that figure is much higher than the peak

in 2020, of 1,050 deaths. "Although economic activity has positively surprised in the second wave and the consensus is that the third outbreak of cases should not stop the resumption of economic activity, it poses serious risks to public accounts and fiscal sustainability and could make the political environment more volatile, which could indirectly hinder GDP growth," Solange Srour and Lucas Vilela point out. DEFORESTATION IN BRAZIL'S AMAZON WORSENED IN RECENT MONTHS, VICE PRESIDENT SAYS

Mourão, who is leading the government's Amazon policy, told reporters in a briefing that deforestation this month is "not good" but reaffirmed a commitment to lower deforestation by 15% in the 12-months through July. Read more.

`THE U.S. WILL NOT DONATE VACCINES TO BRAZIL' – BRAZIL'S HEALTH MINISTER

Health Minister Marcelo Queiroga commented on U.S. President Joe Biden's statement on the intention to donate vaccines against Covid-19 to other countries. Queiroga appreciated the pledge, but said that in the case of Brazil, "being pragmatic," the U.S. will not donate the vaccines, "also because Brazil bought these doses from American companies," he said. In testimony to the Covid CPI (parliamentary investigative committee) on Thursday, May 27, Butantan Institute director Dimas Covas, said that in December last year, when the world was starting Covid-19 vaccination, the Butantan Institute had produced 5.5 million Coronavac doses and 4 million were being processed. Brazilians should prepare for annual Covid-19 immunizations to reinforce vaccines currently available, the head of public-sector laboratory Butantan said on Thursday. Annual boosters would add to the burden for Brazil's shaky national vaccination program, which has struggled to speed up immunizations to confront the world's most deadly coronavirus outbreak. RETURN TO "NORMALITY" TRIGGERS FORMATION OF 3RD WAVE OF COVID-19 IN BRAZIL – FIOCRUZ

The premature resumption of activities in virtually all of Brazil is the main cause for the new wave of Covid-19 in formation. This assessment is contained in the new InfoGripe Bulletin released on Friday, May 28, by the Oswaldo Cruz Foundation (Fiocruz). Read more.

MARCH WAS PANDEMIC'S MOST LETHAL MONTH IN BRAZIL'S PRIVATE HOSPITALS – ANAHP STUDY

An unprecedented study by the National Association of Private Hospitals (ANAHP) found that March 2021 was the worst month of the pandemic in Brazilian private hospitals. In March, the

mortality rate of patients with Covid-19 reached 15.1%, surpassing August 2020's 14.9%, until then the worst month since the start of the pandemic in Brazil. Read more.

PEOPLE UNDER 70 ARE NOW THE MAJORITY AMONG THOSE KILLED BY COVID IN BRAZIL

People aged 69 or less represented 46.72% of the total deaths in January this year, or 21,855. Now this group adds up to 58,260 (170% more) and represents the majority of the dead: 53.78%. This inversion of the death pyramid had already been detected by the SP Covid-19 Info Tracker platform, a tool created by researchers from USP (University of São Paulo) and Unesp (Universidade Estadual Paulista) with support from Fapesp (Fundação de Amparo à Pesquisa no State of São Paulo) to monitor the evolution of the pandemic in the state. BRAZIL TO HAVE 43.8 MILLION VACCINE DOSES IN JUNE

Despite less than the earlier projected 54 million doses of Covid-19 vaccines, the Ministry of Health will have the highest number of doses in June since the start of the campaign, in January 2021 - 43.8 million of the 3 immunizers approved by the Brazilian Health Regulatory Agency (ANVISA). ANVISA WARNS OF RISKS OF INDISCRIMINATE USE OF PARACETAMOL AFTER COVID-19 VACCINATION

The indiscriminate use of paracetamol for pain and fever relief after Covid-19 vaccination can lead to serious adverse events, including drug hepatitis and death, Brazil's health regulatory agency ANVISA has indicated. According to the agency, paracetamol should be used with caution, "always observing the maximum daily dose and the interval between doses, according to the recommendations contained in the package insert, for each age group." EXPERTS ALERT: 17 BRAZILIAN STATES AND THE FEDERAL DISTRICT REGISTER OVER 80% ICU BED OCCUPANCY -FIOCRUZ

Between May 17 and 24, 2021, Covid-19 ICU bed occupancy for adults in the Unified Health System (SUS) either increased or remained stable, at high levels, in virtually all of Brazil. Given this scenario, experts alert to the worsening of the Covid-19 pandemic in the coming weeks. Read more.

COVID-19: BRAZIL SURPASSES ITALY AND BELGIUM; NOW RANKS 5TH IN DEATHS PER MILLION INHABITANTS

The proportional number of victims has increased almost 20% in May, and the lack of control has made the country surpass the United Kingdom, Italy and Belgium in a month marked by crowds encouraged by President Jair Bolsonaro. On Friday, May 28, Brazil exceeded the 459,000 deaths mark caused by the pandemic, and consequently surpassed Belgium to become the country with the 5th-most victims per million inhabitants, among nations with at least 5 million inhabitants.
