COVID CPI: 'SOLUTION FOR THE PANDEMIC IS THE VACCINATION CAMPAIGN,' SAYS QUEIROGA

After the depositions of the first two Ministers of Health of Jair Bolsonaro's government, the Pandemic CPI on Thursday heard the current holder of the portfolio, Marcelo Queiroga, and the President-Director of the Brazilian Health Regulatory Agency (ANVISA), Antonio Barra Torres. In his statement, Queiroga said that "the solution to the pandemic is the vaccination campaign" and stressed that the development of vaccines is "a response from science" to the crisis. In reference to the high numbers of cases and deaths from Covid-19 in the country at the time he took office, the minister stressed that he took office in a closed ceremony because "there was nothing to celebrate." Queiroga pointed out that he is heading a "technical" ministry and stressed the meetings with the WHO (World Health Organization) and the "partnerships" with municipal and state health secretariats that have occurred during his administration. INDUSTRIAL PRODUCTION IN BRAZIL FELL 2.4% IN MARCH, SAYS IBGE

Brazilian industrial production registered a fall of 2.4% in March when compared to February, the Brazilian Institute of Geography and Statistics (IBGE) reported Wednesday, May 5. In comparison with the same month a year ago, however, production rose 10.5%. The expectations in a Reuters poll of economists were for a 3.5% drop in the monthly variation and a high of 7.6% annually. Read more.

MARKET PROJECTS GREATER GROWTH FOR BRAZIL THIS YEAR AND HIGHER SELIC IN 2022

The market is now expecting stronger economic growth this year and a higher basic interest rate in 2022, according to the Focus survey released by the Central Bank on Monday. The weekly survey showed that the expectation now for Gross Domestic Product expansion in 2021 stands at 3.14%, 0.05 percentage points higher than the preceding week. On the other hand, economic growth projection for 2022 fell 0.03 points, to 2.31%. The basic interest rate scenario for the SELIC at the end of this year remained at 5.50%, but for 2022 it rose to 6.25%, from 6.13% in previous median projections. Read more.

DEFORESTATION: BRITISH AND EUROPEAN SUPERMARKETS THREATEN TO BOYCOTT BRAZIL

Large British and European supermarkets and food producers on Wednesday, May 5th, threatened to boycott Brazilian products because of a bill which, they claim, would lead to further deforestation of the Amazon rainforest. Read more.

DEFORESTATION IN THE BRAZILIAN AMAZON BREAKS RECORD IN APRIL

The Brazilian Amazon lost 580.55 kilometers of forest in April, a new record for the month and the largest devastated area for that period in the last six years since the measurement began, according to deforestation alerts released this Friday, May 7. According to monthly data captured by the Real-Time Legal Amazon Deforestation Detection System (Deter) and disclosed by the National Institute of Space Research (INPE), this is an area 42% larger than that destroyed in April 2020. In the beginning of his address, the foreign minister said that China is among the countries prioritized by Brazil, adding that, in addition to being its biggest trade partner, it is among Brazil's five top foreign investors. SUPREME COURT OVERTURNS RULE THAT ALLOWS EXTENSION OF PATENTS

By 9 to 2, the Supreme Federal Court (STF) decided on Thursday (6) to overturn a rule that allows the extension of the term of patents granted by the National Institute of Industrial Property (Inpi). The court resumed the trial of an action by the Attorney General's Office (PGR) challenging the Industrial Property Law, in force since 1996. In practice, the Court's understanding leads to a reduction in the term of patents, affecting the industry as a whole, especially giant markets, such as the pharmaceutical, chemical and biotechnology sectors. BRAZIL TO WORK BY WTO CONSENSUS ON COMPULSORY LICENSE OF COVID VACCINE PATENTS

After the United States announced its support for the suspension of patents on vaccines against covid-19, the Brazilian government issued a note stating that it will seek a consensus solution with the member countries of the World Trade Organization (WTO). The government of Jair Bolsonaro is against the patent break of immunizers. In a public hearing in the Senate on September 7, Foreign Minister Carlos Alberto Franco França reiterated that the measure - defended by several countries to speed up the production of vaccines - does not benefit Brazil.
